TPPP Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program <i>Administered by</i> Office of Adolescent Health (OAH)	TPPP currently funds 84 five-year cooperative agreements with public and private entities in 33 states for capacity building to support implementation of evidence-based TPP programs (8 awards); replicate evidence-based TPPP programs in communicates with greatest needs (50 awards); support early innovation to advance adolescent health (2 awards); rigorous evaluation of new approaches to prevent unintended teen pregnancy (21 awards); and programs designed specifically for young males (3). Programs must be medically accurate, age appropriate, and based on or informed by evidence. DASH Division of Adolescent and School Health <i>Within the</i> National Center for HIV/AIDS, Viral Hepatitis, STD, and TB Prevention (NCHHSTP), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)	DASH funds 18 state education agencies (SEAs) and 17 local school districts to build school capacity to provide students with: 1) exemplary sexual health education (ESHE); 2) increase access to sexual health services (SHS); and 3) safe and supportive environments (SSE). Seven national organizations are funded to provide assistance to SEAs and the school districts and four organizations are funded to build capacity for school districts to provide HIV and other STD prevention for young men who have sex with men (MSM). AOUM Grant Program "Sexual Risk Avoidance"	Program defined as: "Voluntarily refraining from non-marital sexual activity." Teaching the "benefits associated with self-regulation, success sequencing for poverty prevention, healthy relationships, goal setting, and resisting sexual coercion, dating violence, and other youth risk behaviors such as underage drinking or illicit drug use without normalizing teen sexual activity." CAE Competitive "Abstinence Education" Grant program <i>Administered by</i> Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), Administration for Children and Families (ACF)	The CAE grant program provides two-year grants on an annual basis to community and faith-based organizations (10 organizations in 9 states and the District of Columbia). "Abstinence Education," or AOUM programs, are defined by Section 510(b) of Title V of the Social Security Act (P.L. 104-193) as an educational or motivational program that: A. has as its exclusive purpose teaching the social, psychological, and health gains to be realized by abstaining from sexual activity; B. teaches abstinence from sexual activity outside marriage as the expected standard for all school-age children; C. teaches that abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain way to avoid out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and other associated health problems; D. teaches that a mutually faithful monogamous relationship in the context of marriage is the expected standard of sexual activity; E. teaches that sexual activity outside of the context of marriage is likely to have harmful psychological and physical effects; F. teaches that bearing children out-of-wedlock is likely to have harmful consequences for the child, the child's parents, and society; G. teaches young people how to reject sexual advances and how alcohol and drug use increase vulnerability to sexual advances; and H. teaches the importance of attaining self-sufficiency before engaging in sexual activity.	\$5 million	\$0 -\$5 million, but doubled for new "SRA" program (above)	N/A	N/A
