

The Department of Health in North Dakota received \$88,991 in federal funds for abstinence-only-until-marriage programs in Fiscal Year 2008.

### North Dakota Sexuality Education Law and Policy

North Dakota does not mandate sexuality education nor does it address what can or cannot be taught in sexuality education classes. The state also does not have a suggested curriculum.

North Dakota does not require parental permission for students to participate in sexuality or HIV/AIDS education nor does it say whether parents or guardians may remove their children from such classes.

### **Recent Legislation**

SIECUS is not aware of any proposed legislation regarding sexuality education in North Dakota.

#### North Dakota's Youth: Statistical Information of Note<sup>2</sup>

- In 2007, 44% of female high school students and 41% of male high school students in North Dakota reported ever having had sexual intercourse compared to 46% of female high school students and 50% of male high school students nationwide.
- In 2007, 2% of female high school students and 4% of male high school students in North Dakota reported having had sexual intercourse before age 13 compared to 4% of female high school students and 10% of male high school students nationwide.
- In 2007, 11% of female high school students and 11% of male high school students in North Dakota reported having had four or more lifetime sexual partners compared to 12% of female high school students and 18% of male high school students nationwide.
- In 2007, 34% of female high school students and 29% of male high school students in North Dakota reported being currently sexually active (defined as having had sexual intercourse in the three months prior to the survey) compared to 36% of female high school students and 34% of male high school students nationwide.
- In 2007, among those high school students who reported being currently sexually active, 62% of females and 66% of males in North Dakota reported having used condoms the last time they had sexual intercourse compared to 55% of females and 69% of males nationwide.

- In 2007, among those high school students who reported being currently sexually active, 30% of females and 19% of males in North Dakota reported having used birth control pills the last time they had sexual intercourse compared to 19% of females and 13% of males nationwide.
- In 2007, among those high school students who reported being currently sexually active, 27% of females and 30% of males in North Dakota reported having used alcohol or drugs the last time they had sexual intercourse compared to 18% of females and 28% of males nationwide.
- In 2005, 90% of high school students in North Dakota reported having been taught about AIDS/HIV in school compared to 88% of high school students nationwide.<sup>3</sup>

## Title V Abstinence-Only-Until-Marriage Funding

- The North Dakota Department of Health received \$88,991 in federal Title V abstinence-only-until-marriage funding in Fiscal Year 2008.
- The Title V abstinence-only-until-marriage grant requires states to provide three state-raised dollars or the equivalent in services for every four federal dollars received. The state match may be provided in part or in full by local groups.
- SIECUS was unable to determine the exact amount of funding received by each Title V abstinence-only-until-marriage sub-grantee.
- In North Dakota, the state makes up ten percent of the match through state general revenues and the sub-grantees provide the remaining portion of the match through in-kind services.
- The North Dakota Department of Health oversees the funding and retains 10 percent for the salary, benefits, and travel of the program coordinator.
- There are two sub-grantees in North Dakota: Make a Sound Choice and Northern Lights Youth Services.

SIECUS has compiled some examples of the use of federal Title V abstinence-only-until-marriage funding in North Dakota:

#### Make a Sound Choice (2008)

Make a Sound Choice is run by FirstChoice Clinic, a crisis pregnancy center. Crisis pregnancy centers typically advertise as providing medical services and then use anti-abortion propaganda, misinformation, and fear and shame tactics to dissuade women facing unintended pregnancy from exercising their right to choose. On its website, Make a Sound Choice says, "People have different understandings of God. Whatever your present beliefs may be, there is a spiritual side to abortion that deserves to be considered. Having an abortion may affect more than just your body and your mind—it may have an impact on your relationship with God. What is God's desire for you in this situation? How does God see your unborn child? These are important questions to consider."

The organization uses the popular, fear-based curriculum A.C. Green's Game Plan in its abstinence-only-until-marriage program. SIECUS reviewed Game Plan and found that in order to convince high school students to remain abstinent until marriage, the curriculum relies on messages of fear and shame, inaccurate and misleading information, and biased views of marriage, sexual orientation, and family structure. In addition, Game Plan fails to provide important information on sexual health including how students can seek testing and treatment if they suspect they may have an STD. Finally, the format and underlying biases of the curriculum do not allow for cultural, community, and individual values, and discourage critical thinking and discussions of alternate points of view in the classroom. For example, Game Plan compares sex to fire and says: "In a fireplace, fire is beautiful and gives warmth to a home.

Outside of the fireplace, it can cause serious harm." "What about sex? In a marriage relationship, sex can be beautiful. Outside of marriage, it can cause serious harm."

Make a Sound Choice is an affiliate of the Abstinence Clearinghouse.<sup>6</sup> As an affiliate of the Abstinence Clearinghouse, Make a Sound Choice has access to a network of nearly 70 abstinence-only-until-marriage organizations. Affiliates gain access to resources, including abstinence-only-until-marriage curricula and invitations to the Abstinence Clearinghouse conference self-titled as the "most prestigious abstinence-until-marriage event of the year." The founder of the Abstinence Clearinghouse is Leslee Unruh, one of the industry's leaders, who began her career working in a South Dakota crisis pregnancy center and has deep ties to the anti-choice movement.

# Community-Based Abstinence Education (CBAE) and Adolescent Family Life Act (AFLA) Grantees
