


ADOLESCENT SEXUAL HEALTH PROMOTION AT A GLANCE


The following is an overview of the state of adolescent sexual health promotion efforts in Puerto Rico in Fiscal Year (FY) 2012 including sexuality education laws and policy, sexual health data, and federal funding.

SEXUALITY EDUCATION LAW AND POLICY OVERVIEW

[Puerto Rico's health education policy](#) asserts that such education should lead students to develop habits for maintaining good health, including “respect for the body,” in order to develop positive sexual behavior. Puerto Rico schools are required to implement sexuality education programs that address the “physiological and emotional aspects of sexual relations,” “family responsibilities,” and the health risks related to sexual relationships. Puerto Rico does not require parental permission for students to participate in sexuality or HIV/AIDS education, nor does it say whether parents or guardians may remove their children from such classes.

REPORTED SEXUAL ACTIVITY OF YOUNG PEOPLE IN PUERTO RICO

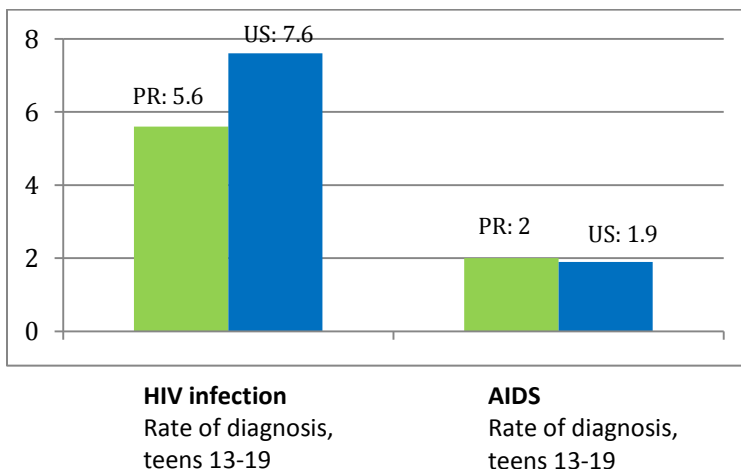
 Among Puerto Rico high school students in 2011, 34% of females and 37% of males reported **ever having had sexual intercourse, lower than the reported national average** of 46% of females and 49% of males.

 Among Puerto Rico high school students in 2011, 23% of females and 22% of males reported being currently sexually active (having had sexual intercourse in the three months prior), **lower than the reported national average** of 34% of females and 33% of males.

PUERTO RICO TEEN BIRTH RATE

 Puerto Rico's teen **birth rate is higher than the U.S. national average**, with 51 teens per 1,000 giving birth compared to 34 teens per 1,000 nationwide in 2010.

PUERTO RICO'S YOUNG PEOPLE: HIV/AIDS RATES IN 2011 (PER 100,000)

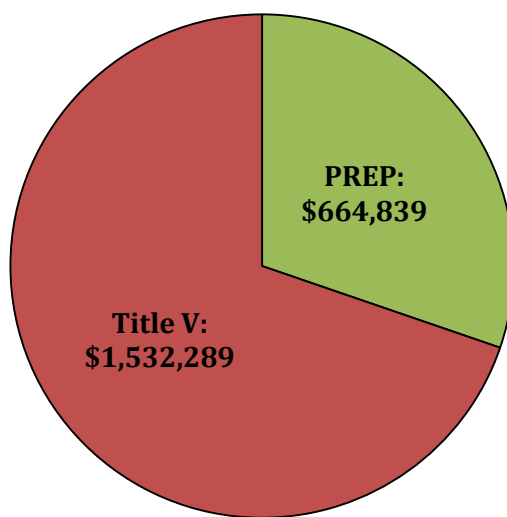


FY 2012 FEDERAL FUNDING IN PUERTO RICO: TOTAL \$2,197,128

**Title V AOUM Program (Title V)
\$899,668**

Puerto Rico has chosen to implement abstinence-only-until-marriage programs through Title V, matching every \$4 federal dollars with \$3 state dollars or in-kind contributions.

The Puerto Rico Department of Health administers the Title V AOUM program through sub-grants and collaboration with the Center for Evaluation and Sociomedical Research and the United Way of Puerto Rico. The United Way also sub-contracts with Programa Comunal de Entrega y Servicio and the Centre Sor Isolina Ferré. The funded programs target 10–12 year olds and their parents in municipalities identified in a needs assessment from the southeast region of Puerto Rico. Programming is provided in Arroyo, Guayama, Humacao, Maunabo, Naguabo, Patillas, Vieques, and Yabucoa. The funding match in Puerto Rico is made with in-kind funds.



Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) \$783,691

Funds for states (PREP), local entities (PREIS), community/faith-based organizations (CPREP), and tribes (TPREP) to implement evidence-informed or innovative teen pregnancy- and HIV/STD-prevention, and adulthood preparation programs for young people.

The Puerto Rico Department of Health implements the state's PREP grant program. Collaborating with public housing authorities and public middle schools, the Department of Health's PREP program targets adolescents ages 12–14 in five municipalities in the south east coast of Puerto Rico, including Humacao, Maunabo, Naguabo, Vieques, and Yabucoa.
