
Executive Summary

Beginning in fiscal year (FY) 2010, a new era, defined by support for evidence-based and evidence-informed adolescent sexual health promotion, resulted in both new and increased support for programs, such as the Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) and the Office of Population Affairs' (OPA) Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program (TPPP), to prevent HIV/AIDS, other sexually transmitted infections (STIs), and unplanned teen pregnancy. While there remains no dedicated federal funding stream for sex education that is in alignment with the National Sex Education Standards, these funding streams and others, such as the Centers for Disease Control's (CDC) Division of Adolescent School Health (DASH), are critical in ensuring adolescent sexual health promotion efforts remain active and impactful in FY2024.


